

Because how would we make progress,


Without some individuals who wished to digress,

THE BATMAN

A WHOLEHEARTED FILM TRYING ITS VERY BEST TO OUTDO ITS PREDECESSOR.

A gripping tale of a masked vigilante fighting crime in a somewhat forlorn city, Matt Reeves' latest film The Batman is the perfect definition of what you would call dark and dingy. Lurking in the shadows of its predecessor, the Dark Knight Trilogy, the film brings to stage a completely revamped version of Batman – vulnerable, persistent and troubled by his surroundings. We see a more mature individual, too, in Robert Pattinson's portrayal of the Batman, now in his second year of defending Gotham from corrupt and malicious habitants. Throughout the film, the protagonist seems to be undergoing a turbulent internal conflict, in the form of a recurring question to be or not to be? To take on his family's legacy and be part of Gotham's elite (the majority of whom are corrupt), or to renounce them and root out corruption in a city rotten to the core.

The dark and gloomy atmosphere depicted in the film excellently compliments the underlying theme of the movie – oppression. The main antagonist of this film, The Riddler (Paul Dano), is a much more refined version of his 1995 counterpart, Jim Carey's wacky vet devious character.

The Riddler seems to be perennially one step ahead of Batman through almost the entirety of the film, striking a great contrast between 'The Batman' and most superhero films.




Instead of a typical superhero flick, Reeves' neo-noir detective mystery attempts to delve deeper into societal and psychological issues. We see a very self-centred man in the Batman who is slowly familiarizing himself with the concept of teamwork in order to achieve his desired purpose.

Supporting characters Selina Kyle (Zoe and Carmine Falcone Kravitz) (John excellent their Turturro) are representation of determined citizens of Gotham (one determined to avenge the death of her friend and the other to expand his empire as a mob boss in Gotham). Colin Farrell's depiction of the Penguin displays his adaptability as well as his agreement to step out of his comfort zone if necessary. His character acts as the bridge in a film, creating a link between the many events simultaneously taking place, while also providing occasional comic relief.

All and all, The Batman is a very well-made film that comes as a relief for Batman fans after 11 long years of waiting. While it may not be able to live up to the Dark Knight, it is surely a film that subtly highlights the themes of growth and change in a character once known to be very conventional and one-dimensional in nature.





SAWAYAMA, Japanese-British musician Rina Sawayama's debut album, is at its core a collection of stories about growth-personal, political and social. Tracks like Dynasty, Bad Friend and Chosen Family feature her growth as a person, through generational trauma, insecurity and into finding a sense of community. XS, one of the most popular songs on the album, covers themes like consumerism and environmental decay. This album is incredibly diverse, displaying Sawayama's unique ability to discuss complex personal and social growth in carefully crafted songs. And the cherry on top of the cake is this album's production-which can only be described as incredibly distinctive and futuristic, and hopefully, the future of pop production.

MONTERO (2021)

When he burst into the music industry in 2019 with his hit single Old Town Road, Montero Lamar Hill, known by his stage name Lil Nas X was far from being taken seriously, and was considered more of a meme than a real artist. He truly did prove critics wrong with his debut album, Montero, a touching autobiographical take on the music industry and how Hill hopes to navigate it in the future. 
MODERN FAMILY



Over the last 7 years, camera filters have taken social media by storm. When Snapchat introduced their 'Lenses' feature in 2015, teenagers and adults across the world were enamoured by the ease with which they could transform themselves into puppies, rainbow-spitting leprechauns, and fairies, with the touch of a button. In fact, I can guarantee that every teenager and young adult has at least one remnant of this era on their camera roll-and it is most definitely a baby-faced selfie with the flower crown filter.

Instagram soon followed suit, introducing their own filters in 2017. Around this time, the popularity of more bizarre filters like the quintessential puppy filter and the flower crown filter began to falter, and a wave of semi-realistic, subtler filters took over. These are arguably technological marvels in their ability to subtly enhance facial features, but the insidious side of this growing trend cannot be ignored.

I mentioned earlier that these subtle filters 'enhanced' the user's facial features, but what does this actually entail? Often, it translates to lightening the user's skin tone and eye colour, shrinking or narrowing their nose, and sharpening their cheekbones and jawline-essentially, it means conforming to Western beauty standards.



It might be an exaggeration to call this a new form of colonisation-after all, I'm sure the artists behind these filters aren't trying to reinforce harmful beauty standards. These Western standards are just what is generally accepted as 'beautiful' and 'aesthetically pleasing'.

Oddly, social media markets itself as a place for positivity, and a huge part of that is body positivity.

Models, actors and influencers are becoming increasingly transparent about body modification procedures (both digital and surgical) that they undergo, reducing unrealistic body expectations significantly. On the other hand, these filters are incredibly regressive for the body positivity movement, subtly imbibing in teenagers that this is how they must look–smooth–skinned, with a petite nose, and a sharp jawline.

And so there's no denying that these filters are doing significant harm. So many teenagers using Instagram take pictures through the app directly, often donning these filters as a habit. This has sinister implications for self-image-in fact many experts are now asking if these filters could lead to a growing trend in body dysmorphia in teens, and I truly believe that they actively are doing so.





Also, from past experience, I knew that my music made people happy, so I figured why not share it with a bigger crowd


How has music helped you develop as a person?
